The ALA Council ADOPTEDALA CD#20.2 and ALA CD#19.2, Resolution on Expanding Federal Whistleblower Protections, which read "That the American Library Association (ALA), on behalf of its members:

- urges Congress to amend the Whistleblower Protection Enhancement Act of 2012 to extend existing legal protections for whistleblowers to employees of all national security and intelligence agencies, and to non -federal employees working for civilian contractors;
- urges Congress to establish a secure procedure by which all federal employees, and all non-federal employees working for civilian contractors, may safely share evidence they have discovered of fraud, waste, or abuse with the appropriate oversight committees of Congress, and directly with the press and the American people, with the protection of legally enforceable rights against retaliation or prosecution;
- 3. commends the courage and perseverance of federal employees, and non employees working for civilian contractors, who risk their livelihoods, their reputa and their liberty to expose evidence of government fraud, waste, or abuse."
